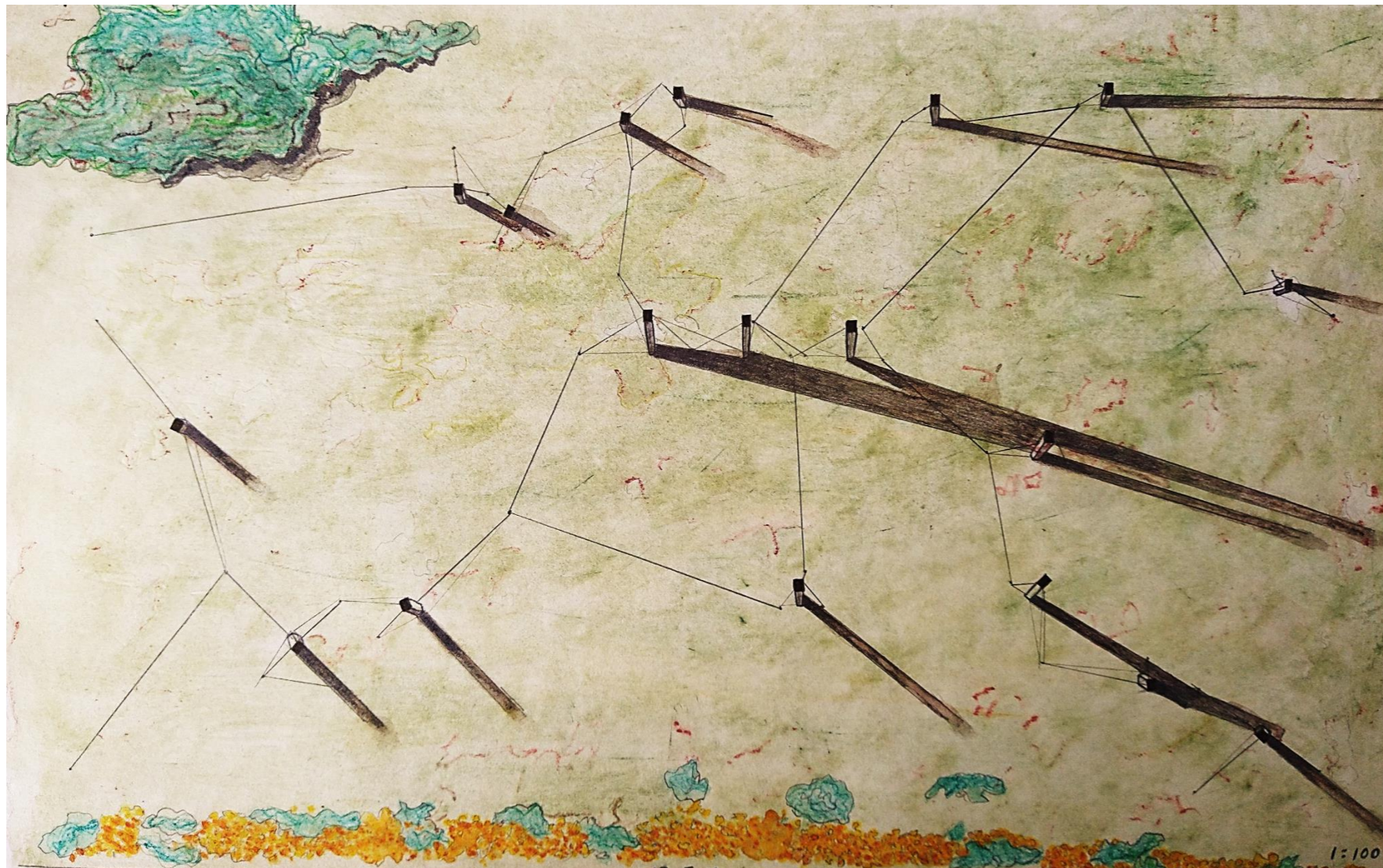


ROOTS

Site specific piece

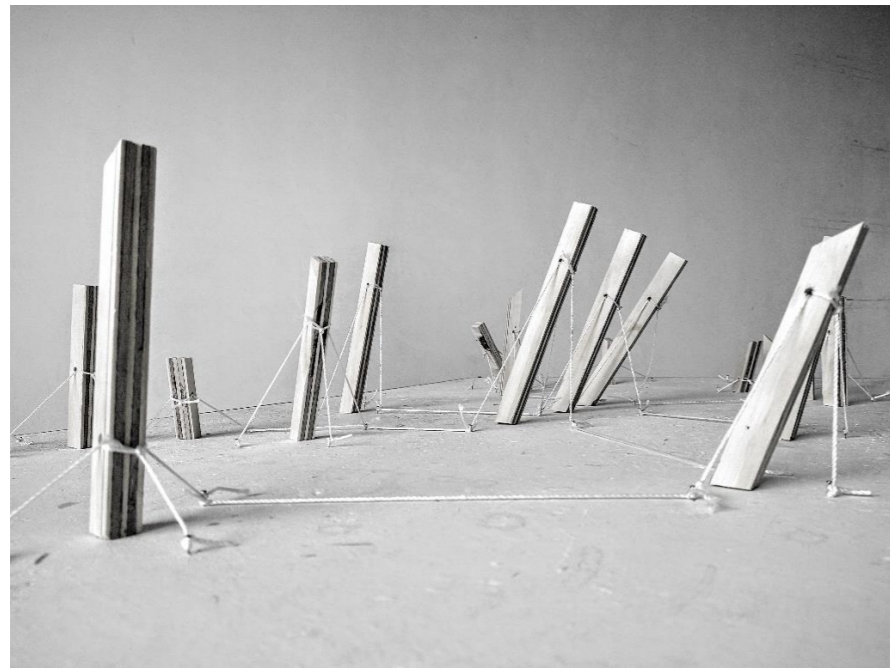
2.44 x 13.5 x 9 m
18 pieces of wood [variable heights and inclinations]
grounded with fiber rope and reed

Suggested vegetation: *cempoalxochitl* flower [due this plant blooms only by the end of october the suggested plants could be yellow carnations instead.

Eric Dardel speaks on his book *L'homme et la terre* [1952] about the irrefutable terrestrial condition of the human being that he calls "geographicite". Geographicite could be understand as the movement of the human over the land, the world that we are created by inhabit on it . This idea define our relationship and place with the space, with this world, but also define our human condition that connect us and tie us with the land. We live and we die here. There is no place to go.

I wonder, where is my place? Where should I stay and make a living, a foundation if I constantly move? Where I belong if I have no land to build up? How many do I need?
