Native Leafy Plants

Ferns (Various Species):

Many fern species are native to Quebec, such as the Lady Fern (*Athyrium filix-femina*) and Ostrich Fern (*Matteuccia struthiopteris*). They can thrive in shallow soils and are adaptable to varying light conditions. Canadian Wild Ginger (*Asarum canadense*):

Features heart-shaped leaves and thrives in moist, shady environments, making it suitable for suspended gardens. Liverworts (*Marchantiophyta*):

These non-flowering plants can grow on moist, shaded walls and suspended settings, adding a lush green texture. Mosses (Various Species):

Native mosses, like Fern Moss (*Thuidium delicatulum*), can create a verdant cover in shaded, moist conditions.

Creeping Juniper (*Juniperus horizontalis*):

A low-growing conifer that can adapt to poor, shallow soils and is drought-tolerant.

Native Flowering Plants

Canadian Columbine (*Aquilegia canadensis*):

Offers distinct red and yellow flowers and can grow in less fertile soil, suitable for suspended gardens. Black-Eyed Susan (*Rudbeckia hirta*):

A hardy flowering plant with bright yellow flowers that can tolerate a range of soil conditions. Wild Bergamot (*Monarda fistulosa*):

Known for its fragrant leaves and lavender flowers, it’s adaptable to various soil types.

Purple Coneflower (*Echinacea purpurea*):

With its distinctive purple-pink flowers, it’s resilient and can thrive in shallow soil. Goldenrod (*Solidago* spp.):

A late-summer bloomer, it’s adaptable and can grow in challenging conditions, adding bright yellow hues.

(Final selection of plants are to be discussed with the local team as appropriate and suitable for growing on suspended threads with shallow soils)
