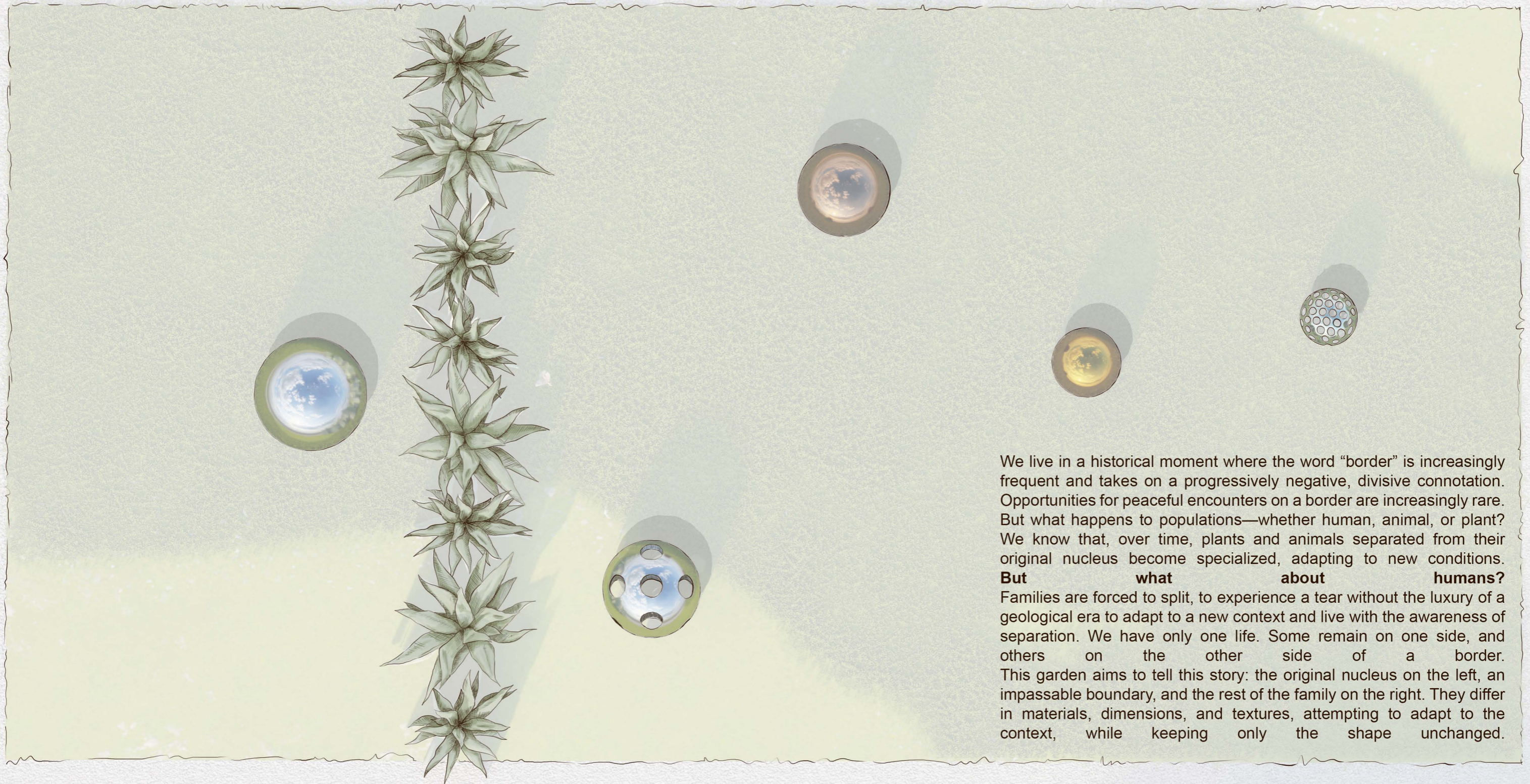


# BORDERS AND BEYOND



We live in a historical moment where the word “border” is increasingly frequent and takes on a progressively negative, divisive connotation. Opportunities for peaceful encounters on a border are increasingly rare. But what happens to populations—whether human, animal, or plant? We know that, over time, plants and animals separated from their original nucleus become specialized, adapting to new conditions. **But what about humans?** Families are forced to split, to experience a tear without the luxury of a geological era to adapt to a new context and live with the awareness of separation. We have only one life. Some remain on one side, and others on the other side of a border. This garden aims to tell this story: the original nucleus on the left, an impassable boundary, and the rest of the family on the right. They differ in materials, dimensions, and textures, attempting to adapt to the context, while keeping only the shape unchanged.

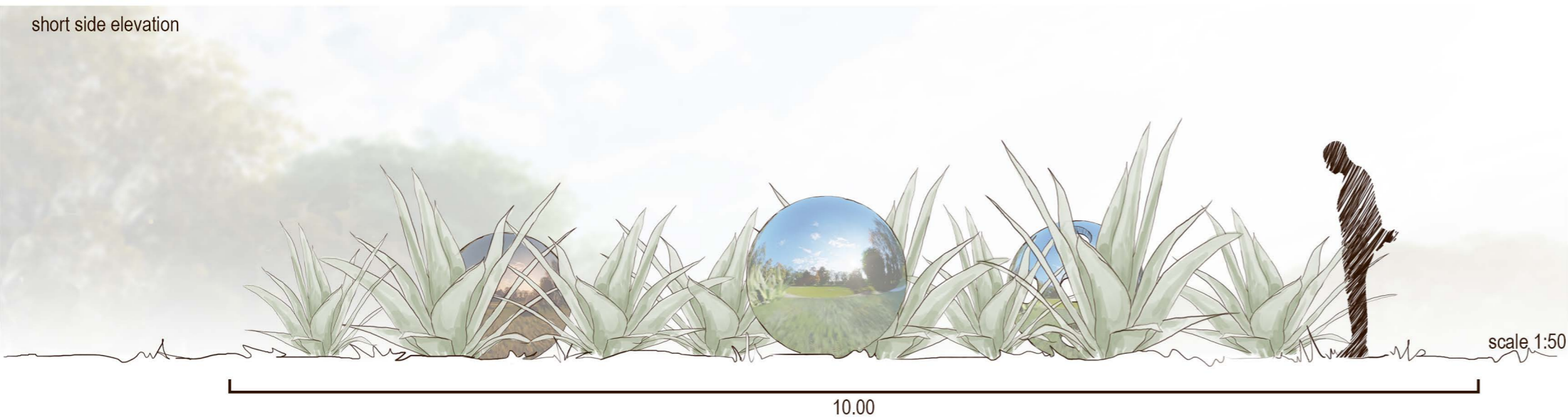


*Yucca glauca*
